3: IMPORTANT UPDATES

- WORLD GLAUCOMA WEEK REPORT - 2019

Once again we joined the rest of the World to mark World Glaucoma Week (WGW), from 10th to 16th March, 2019. This time the clinic was involved with two main activities. Hosting a clinical meeting which was held on Wednesday, 13th March 2019, and participation in community health promotion campaign focused on glaucoma, the program is run by Community Health Education section of the Ministry of Health Community Development Gender Elderly and Children (MoHCDEC)

The clinical meeting was very successful, and we are very grateful for the attendance of all participants 20 in number being representatives from Muhimbili National Hospital, Muhimbili University of Allied Health Sciences (MUHAS), CCBRT Hospital, Dr Agarwals Eye Hospital (DAEH)-Dar-es-Salaam, Regency Hospital, Siha Optical and Eye Centre, and Optical Centre. Special

thanks go to our National Eye Care Program Manager Dr Bernadetha R. Shilio from MoHCDEC who joined us and made closing remarks despite of her very busy schedule. The participants were Ophthalmologists, Assistant Medical Officer in Ophthalmology (AMO-O), Optometrist, Ophthalmic nurses, Ophthalmic residents and an invited scientist.

The held clinical meeting was part our regular Continuous Professional Development (CPD) sessions which are done twice a month across eye centres here in Dar es Salaam, providing an opportunity for knowledge and experiences sharing amongst eye care professionals.

The clinical meeting had the following outlines

• Presentation

Dr Hassan made a 20 minutes presentation titled; Glaucoma Care at NVSEC- One year review. In summary, results from a retrospective review of 100 patients with Chronic Glaucoma attended at NVSEC for the first time in 2017 and had a one year period of follow up suggested a better profile in terms of disease awareness, disease morbidity and treatment outcomes compared to previous results done ten to fifteen years ago across several eye clinics in Sub Saharan Africa. The present findings suggest what possible can be achieved on practical terms for glaucoma care in Sub Saharan Africa. [Click here] for the finding details.

• Round table discussion

The forum had an opportunity for 40 minutes discussion after the presentation and here were the main points raised

- Increase glaucoma awareness in the community e.g commemorating the World Glaucoma Week by performing more outdoor activities like Glaucoma march, eye screening/camps e.t.c
- Actively involve the media in community health promotion campaigns focusing on Glaucoma awareness like Prepare and deliver Annual Press Release by high authorities in the Ministry during World Glaucoma Week as it has happened for the last two years.

- Increase glaucoma cases detection during opportunity screening for patients who have turned up in our clinics for eye examination, alongside improving clinical work ups for correct diagnosis of different types of glaucoma.
- The need to find the current situation of glaucoma care in the country by designing a multi centered studies to look on important parameters like treatment acceptance and adherence, as well as treatment outcomes from different glaucoma treatment options available in the country.
